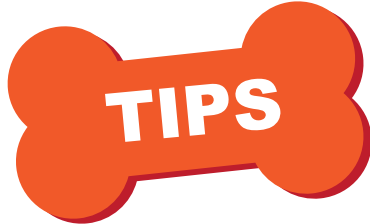




# ASK Around the House Safety Information



Know the things in your bathroom that are poisonous. Look at the labels for the words “Caution,” “Warning,” “Danger,” “Poison” or the phrase “Keep Out of Reach of Children” on the box or bottle.

Get on the floor and see what your child can see from their level. Make sure all dangerous items are out of their reach.

Tie window cords up and make sure they are out of your child’s reach.
