



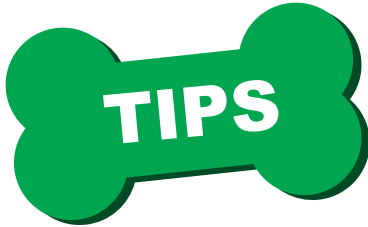
ASK Vehicle Safety Information

Infants should ride rear facing until they reach the highest weight or height allowed by their car safety seat's manufacture.

All children ages 12 years and younger should ride in the back seat.

If available, activate the power window lock switch so that your children cannot play with the windows.
